THE GFCA POLLINATOR PATCH PROJECT from GFCA's Environmentalism-at-Home Group

"Every square inch of planet earth has ecological significance, even where we live, work, and play. If we landscape these areas with plant function as well as aesthetics in mind, we can create viable habitat where humans are, not just where humans are not." --Doug Tallamy

Many of us have a "pollinator patch" garden that includes native plants and provides forage for butterflies, bees, other beneficial insects, and songbirds. While a few pollinator patches have little impact on declining pollinator and bird populations, a patchwork of these plantings across



many yards can. The GFCA Pollinator Patch project takes up this challenge and invites you to participate!

Increasingly we are learning about the key role the suburban yard must play: University of Delaware entomologist and founder of the Homegrown National Park, Doug Tallamy, explains that the land we think of as provided for "nature" consists mostly of isolated fragments of land often too degraded or too tiny to support thriving ecosystems. Since 83% of land in the US is privately owned, Tallamy argues, we must make space for nature in our own yards. And here is the critical part: it is only collectively that we can make this work.

The pollinator patch project is intended to recognize and inspire gardening for pollinators in Greater Farmland. GFCA members and non-member neighbors with pollinator garden plots can participate by requesting a Greater Farmland Pollinator Patch yard sign. Participants in the project pay \$10 towards the cost of the sign, with the GFCA covering the remainder. DIFFERING LEAF COLLECTION PROTOCOLS IN GREATER FARMLAND by Diana Keohane

Some homes in our community have their leaves picked up differently from others. You may start seeing signs alerting you to an upcoming date for leaf vacuuming. The dividing line for this is homes on and east of Tildenwood Drive (Tilden Woods). Those residents may pile leaves at the edge of the curb, out of the street. For all homes west of Tildenwood Drive (Old Farm & Walnut Woods), leaves will not be vacuumed and must be bagged and placed at the curb, not in the street, for pickup with weekly yard waste collection. Alternatively, leaves can be mulched into your lawn and/or piled into your garden beds to foster native insect habitat through the winter.

The County Board of Elections site has tabs for voting, voter registration, and all other topics. You can find out where and when to vote in person at an early voting location and where to drop off a completed ballot. The closest ballot box drop-off is in front of the Montgomery County Conference Center on Executive Blvd. The easiest early voting center to get to is Potomac Recreation Center at 11315 Falls Road. Early voting at that location starts runs from October 24-31.

Want information about the candidates? I go to **vote411.org**, add my address, and it will guide me through the entire ballot and every candidate's answers to pertinent questions. It is run by the League of Women Voters Montgomery County.

WHAT'S HAPPENING AT THE KENNEDY SHRIVER AQUATIC CENTER?

A leaky roof, worn out pool equipment, and a wonky HVAC system prompted the county to close the Kennedy Shriver Aquatic Center for badly need renovations. For 35 years, the neighborhood has enjoyed the center's 50 meter swim and dive pool, diving tower, 2 hydrotherapy areas, leisure pool, 200 foot water flume, and weight room. During the closure, swim clubs and high school teams are practicing at the Germantown Indoor Swim Center, while community swimmers' annual passes are honored at the county pools in White Oak, Olney, Germantown, and the new Silver Spring Recreation and Aquatic Center. The renovations are expected to take 18 months with reopening projected for fall 2026.

NORTH BETHESDA LIFE SCIENCES DEVELOPMENT NEWS

Montgomery County and WMATA announced a memorandum of understanding for a North Bethesda national center for life sciences and medical research development partnership to be built on nearly 14 acres adjoining the North Bethesda Metro Station on Marinelli Rd. The development also will promote transit ridership and will include housing, office and retail space, along with public spaces. The life sciences sector will include medical and bioresearch, health data research, healthcare, and manufacturing. A developer has not been selected, but WMATA has released a request for bids. "When I was first elected five and a half years ago, my goal was to create a development scenario for White Flint because it's simply the largest redeveloped space on the Red Line," Elrich said. "There is no place else that you can pack in 15 million square feet in an environment that is basically ready for a lot of stuff on the ground. So this was a very unique place in Montgomery County." "[This is about] reimagining what this transit site could be, not just a stop ... but really above the cutting-edge innovation, a vibrant place and space for people to be able to live and to work and to meet all of their needs within walking distance of where they live and where they go to work," County Council President Andrew Friedson said during the press conference. The project is being supported by \$5 million in federal funding from Congress. Senators Ben Cardin and Chris Van Hollen were on hand Monday to present a ceremonial check. "These funds are really competitive. They're not easy to come by," Cardin said. "But your plan, your partnership, set you up for success, and we're glad to be part of that coalition."

PLANTING TREES? GET YOUR DISCOUNTS AND FREEBIES HERE!

Fall is a great time to plant new trees and shrubs! If you are looking to add trees or to replace a tree recently removed, consider these great cost-saving programs offered through Montgomery County and the State of Maryland.

(1) Discount coupons for tree purchases. Montgomery County is offering a "Reforest Montgomery" coupon worth \$50 off on a qualifying tree with a retail value of at least \$75 from one of the participating garden centers. Maryland is offering a \$25 coupon toward the purchase of one qualifying tree with the retail value of \$50 or more at participating nurseries and garden centers. Best of all, these coupons can be used together for \$75 off the price of a tree that qualifies for both programs. (2) Free trees planted for free courtesy of the Tree Montgomery program. Just fill in the application form, meet with their experts on your site, finalize your tree choices, and sip your coffee in a comfy chair while the county installs your trees. HOME SAFETY SUGGESTIONS FOR THE FALL/WINTER

- 1. Have your fireplace cleaned and inspected before using it.
- 2. Stack firewood and lay mulch at least one foot from any wall to prevent termite intrusion into your house structure.
- 3. Clean gutters and downspouts after the leaves fall. Water intrusion promotes mold growth.
- 4. Clean out the clothes dryer flue to prevent fire. There are companies that will come do this.
- 5. Check that your smoke & carbon monoxide detectors are less than 10 years old to be sure they will alert when needed.
