WHITE FLINT DEVELOPMENT UPDATE

The Greater Farmland Civic Association joined with a number of other neighborhood groups and Friends of White Flint in sending a letter to County Executive Leggett insisting that the reconstruction of Old Georgetown Road next to the Pike and Rose development be done according to the White Flint Plan. which calls for a reduction in traffic lanes along with wider sidewalks that accommodate bikes and pedestrians. The state, which controls this road, is insisting on widening the road and adding additional vehicle lanes, in direct violation of the plan. This will test whether the county is willing to do its part to ensure that the agreed upon Plan is followed.

The first phase of Pike and Rose will officially open in early December. Businesses include an iPic movie theater with reserved seating, several sit down and casual restaurants, including Del Frisco's steak-

house, &Pizza, a new Sport & Health Club, City Sports, a relocated La Madeleine and Chipotle and a new performance venue for Strathmore. The second phase is now under construction and will include a bowling and bocce alley and a 177-room Canopy hotel from Hilton. Federal Realty, the developers, will tell us more at our next community meeting and will be offering our community a pre-opening tour.

Let's keep a lookout for suspicious activity and keep our neighborhood safe.

MCPD has the following additional safety tips:

- 1. Do not have packages delivered to your house if you are not home to receive them. Make arrangements for them to be delivered to a neighbor or pick them up at the shipper's local office.
- 2. Do not fall prey to phone scams, especially the most recent where someone calls representing themselves as a police officer or from the IRS and tells you to send money or you will be arrested. Another is a call from a utility company threatening to cut off power unless you

wire cash immediately.

If you are unsure of the legitimacy of a caller, see http://www.snopes.com or simply ask for his or her company contact information so you can research the claims before deciding whether to call back.

- 3. The county Police Department does not solicit money. Be wary of phone calls from people claiming to represent law enforcement.
- 4. Pedestrian safety is a must. It gets dark early. You may see a car, but the driver probably does not see you. Wear reflective clothing. Cross at marked intersections. Pay attention to your surroundings.

For those with schoolage children, county police in conjunction with the public schools, have installed cameras in school buses to catch drivers

who don't obey school bus traffic laws. If you pass a stopped school bus with its red lights flashing, you will be receiving a citation in the mail in the amount of \$125.

Remember - you may not pass a school bus with flashing red lights from either direction, even on multilane roads, unless the road is divided by a physical barrier and you are on the side opposite from the bus.

- 5. When you shop, hide your items in the trunk and take them immediately into your home. This is a very prevalent crime this time of year. Thieves will generally ignore a locked car with nothing worth stealing visible and move on to the unlocked one.
- 6. Don't forget that handheld cell phone use while driving is a primary offense. Officers are enforcing this law vigorously. Bluetooth is still permissible.
