

I-270 Is Again a Target for Widening or Toll Lanes

The GFCA Board filed a comment with the Maryland Department of Transportation regarding the Managed Lane Study for Interstates 495 & 270. The letter states, in part, that Governor Hogan's study is flawed, as it focuses on ways to move traffic faster. The Board argues that the state should be looking at a comprehensive approach on how to manage future growth in a way that allows for continued economic growth without the need for major new road infrastructure. The state should be figuring out ways to improve public transportation options that make other modes of transportation more accessible, affordable, reliable, with viable alternatives to the single-occupancy vehicle. Expansion of the METRO and MARC systems, building the Corridor Cities Transitway, bus-rapid transit and neighborhood public transportation options, such as regularly scheduled jitneys, should be explored. Smart growth around areas with strong public transportation infrastructure that (1) provides opportunities for people to live, work and play in a single area, (2) provides housing for persons of all income levels, and (3) requires modal splits that significantly reduce single occupancy vehicle traffic need to be prioritized and incentivized. Updates to the study and hearings will be publicized on the GFCA listsery.


Trillium Landscape has been contracted to maintain prominent traffic islands and consulted on the design and selection of plants for this project.

New projects will be announced via the GFCA listserv.


MORE Successes and Fun this Past Summer...

Free Bulk Trash and Appliance/Scrap Metal Curbside Pickups

County residents who receive county trash service can request up to 5 bulk curbside collections a year. This includes mattresses & box springs, rugs, and furniture. For info or to schedule a pickup, call 311 or visit montgomerycountymd.gov/bulktrash. Large metal items can also be collected curbside, montgomerycountymd.gov/scrapmetal.

Items collected at curbside go to the landfill, and are not recycled or reused.

Recycling Matters

You can drop off many items for recycling at the Shady Grove Solid Waste Transfer Station (just south of Shady Grove Road on the Pike. Information and the drop-off location can be found at montgomerycountymd.gov/sws/dropoff. Click on "What materials does the transfer station accept?" Acceptable items include appliances/scrap metal, electronics, most light bulbs, rechargeable batteries, large hard plastics, discarded engine oil, hazardous materials, and usable-condition building components. These include ceiling fans, appliances, toilets and sinks, kitchen/bath cabinets, and floor tiles. Under the Recyclables heading, click on "building materials in usable condition."

Re-usable building components: Discards from your remodeling jobs (cabinetry, doors, windows, wood flooring, sinks, working appliances, countertops, lighting fixtures, etc.) can be tax-deductible contributions if you get them appraised before pick-up by Second Chance, secondchanceinc.org.

GARDEN CLUB NEWS AND TIPS

The Garden Club has taken root quite vigorously! Our meetings have included lectures and discussions on Dealing with Deer, Gardening in the Shade, Native Plants, and Gardening to Protect Pollinators. We've toured several member gardens, and have lots planned. We are excited to invite anyone who might be interested in joining our group.

- Check houseplants for insects before bringing them inside. Wash off pests or apply houseplant insecticide to control aphids, scale, spider mites, and mealy bugs.
- Prune tree and shrub branches this month only if they are dead, diseased, or damaged. Wait until after all the leaves have dropped for all other pruning.
- Powdery Mildew is a common disease of dogwood, lilac, and other landscape plants. Affected leaves turn white and droop. Prune to increase air circulation. No fungicide sprays will be effective now, but can be applied next year, or use horticultural oil labeled for powdery mildew control.
- Lettuce, spinach, arugula, and kale can be planted through the middle of the month.
- Leaves that fall onto the lawn can be run over several times with a lawnmower until pieces are small and left to decompose naturally. They'll release nutrients and add organic matter to the soil; they won't hurt the turf. However, deep piles of leaves need to be removed or turf will smother and die.
- Mid-October is the recommended cut-off for seeding a lawn, but a few weeks later is OK if it's warm.

BEST TO BE SAFE... AND LEGAL -SMOKE DETECTORS

Montgomery County law requires at least one smoke detector on each level of a home. It is best to have one in or just outside every bedroom, as well.

Any smoke detector over 10 years old must be discarded and a new one with a 10-year sealed lithium-ion battery installed. The new devices don't require annual maintenance, and can be found in local hardware stores. Some are combined with a carbon monoxide detector, another safety item for any house with natural gas heat, water heater, and/or appliances. If you haven't replaced your smoke/fire detectors in the past 10 years, your old ones are probably nonfunctional (even if the battery tests OK, it is unlikely to detect fire and smoke) and certainly aren't legal.

The Montgomery County Fire and Rescue Service will come to your house for free to do a safety check. They will help you locate your detectors. If you are a senior citizen, disabled, or economically challenged, they will provide the smoke detectors and install them, free of charge. Go to this site to request a safety check (if you don't have a computer, call me, and I'll submit the request for you).
